We raised the sum of £215 which will be donated to 'Bibles for Bairns.'

In September we welcomed Catriona MacAulay who has been a puppy walker for Guide Dogs for the Blind for many years. October brought Helen Guyan who spoke enthusiastically about the work of the Pandita Mukti Mission in Pakistan.

The St Andrew's Night in November was a fun evening with the entertainment provided by Kenneth Blackburn, our wonderful organist. His music was match by his sartorial elegance as always. We were delighted to welcome friends from guilds in Helensburgh, Dumbarton Lomond and Luss.

Our December meeting was a fun afternoon, with carols, mince pies and Secret Santa. The January meeting brought the Minister who gave a thought provoking and inspirational talk on the theme, Sure Foundations. Sadly in January we lost one of our longest serving and faithful members with the death of our friend Pam Goldie. Pam loved the Guild and her lovely smile cheered up many a dull day.

On Sunday 26th of January we enjoyed a very special celebration for our 90th anniversary when the Right Rev. Dr Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly led worship and along with Christina Paterson, the National Convener of the Guild and the National Secretary, joined the congregation for lunch**

In February John Nonhabel from The Prison Fellowship, gave us much to think about as he asked us to think about the effects of prison on not just those incarcerated but also on their families.

At our March meeting we heard about the work of CrossReach the social care arm of the Church of Scotland. CrossReach does amazing work across the country, offering help and support to young mothers coping with post-natal depression, support to those suffering from alcohol and drug addiction, and caring for those in their older years suffering from dementia.

As fund raisers go I think we can count the Fiddlers Concert as a very successful evening. Again an occasion that brought folks from outwith the village. The magnificent sum of £1000 was raised which allowed us to pay our dues to the church and our annual commitment to Erskine and Dr Graham's Homes in Kalimpong

As I said this has been a very special and happy year but now it is time to say a very sad goodbye. Maggie is retiring and we have to be brave and unselfish and wish her well. On the day Maggie first preached as Minister of Cardross Parish Church she said ' I understand that I am here as a 70 per cent minister but I am not a 70 per cent person' and my goodness she has proved that over and over again in the past 10 years. Her support for this congregation and the wider community of Cardross has been quite amazing. We know her support for the Guild has been unstinting, she even took on the Convener's role for a year.

And so, it will go on until I leave. There will be my last school service, my last Messy Church, my last Holiday Club, my last Home Communion, my last wedding, my last funeral, my last visit to the HUB, my last Kirk Session and so much more. For me these "lasts" mark the beginning of the end of my time in Cardross but for you they mark the end of the beginning when you can look forward to a new minister coming and a new time of hope for the future.

By the time you read this Presbytery will have appointed an Interim Moderator to work with the Kirk Session in preparation for the vacancy. The Presbytery Plan states that Cardross is a 70% ministry and there is no reason why this should not continue. We have all worked so hard over these past ten years and have had many challenges such as COVID to contend with.

The Mission of the Church has continued to reach many across the generations both locally and beyond. Your faithfulness and dedication have brought stability to the Charge and enabled Presbytery to see the potential in keeping a church presence in this amazing village where so much is happening because of wonderful people working in the various community groups. At the recent Local Church Review (the old Quinquennial review process) the Presbytery representatives were very impressed with all that Cardross does as a congregation. I feel I am leaving you in good heart and a sound financial situation.

I commend you all for your hard work and pray that the Lord will grant you peace of heart and strength of spirit as you continue to serve him.

After I leave there will be a Locum appointed to lead worship and attend to pastoral needs until a new minister is chosen. And then, there will be many "firsts" for that person and all of you.

You will always have a very special place in my heart, and I shall remember you with real gratitude and love. I have had the privilege of being your pastor in times of joys and sorrows. I have been humbled and touched over these years by the way you have welcomed me into your homes and lives. There has been the joy of welcoming new people to our congregation and also children through baptism. There has been the sorrow of saying goodbye to dear friends who have been called home to their Heavenly Father.

Both Neil and I have considered you as family and it will be hard to part as it is for anyone to leave family behind. But we are heartened in knowing that together we all continue to place our trust in the Risen Jesus who says, "I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End." (Revelation 22:13)

Perhaps then, "firsts" and "lasts" should not matter in light of Christ's everlasting love.

But for now, dear friends, my "last" signing off for FOCUS, as I have always done is one in which I send you God's richest blessings.



THANK YOU FOR THE MUSIC KENNETH!





How the HUB changes lives



In January this year the Hub donated £400 to a Pakistani minister who builds water pumps and toilets for remote villages in the desert in Pakistan. Sohail is a minister in the Church of Pakistan who because of family illness has had to relocate to Europe. He now lives in Holland but visits Pakistan as often as he is able. In February he went back to Pakistan with our money and another £400 raised in Holland. There he oversaw the work in two villages to build a water pump and toilet for women in each village. Our village was Abisia, Tehsil Liquat Pur, in Rahim Yar Khan which is near the Thar Desert in the south of Pakistan. The people living there have no source of clean water or toilets so go out into the desert when they need to use the toilet. Having easily accessible clean water and a toilet within the village has changed their lives.

The Hub would like to thank everyone who supports us in any way because without you we would not be able support Sohail's work in Pakistan.
