NEW YEAR AND NEW IMPROVEMENT WORK FOR CHURCH COMPLETED

Extensive work to the main entrance of the church and to the car park has been undertaken to improve the look and the safety of our buildings and grounds. Property Convenor, Tom Darroch along with Judy Wilson arranged and oversaw the much needed work on the Church entrance and the rutted surface of the car park. Read all about the improvements in Tom's property report on Page 2....... The Congregation will have noticed a great deal of activity over recent weeks both in the church grounds and the car park serving the church halls. Trail and Queen have done a great job transforming the church grounds and finding a solution to the flooding problem at the church gate. All paths around the church were lifted and treated with weedkiller before the laying down of a membrane and covering with new gravel, which should prove to be of real benefit during the summer. Once this was completed the company lifted a number of rows of slabs to raise the level of the ground, put in a small drain and then relaid slabs right out to the gate which should not only solve the flooding problem but provides secure footing and a pleasing entranceway into the front door.

The car park has also been resurfaced by Macrete Ltd. This involved removal of remains of the old bunkers adjacent to the kitchen. The company also relaid or renewed the kerbing around the edges of the car park and created a run off for the discharge of water to a soakaway drain within the grassed area. This will hopefully prove to be a long term solution to the car park issues and in addition to making it look real good should make it safer for both cars and their occupants.

We are grateful to both companies for the way in which they have carried out this work which was often done during inclement weather. Special thanks to Judy Wilson who arranged and oversaw the works to the car park.

Dear Friends,

I have known people over the years who have been very traditional in their ways. They would never pass a penny lying on the ground but had to pick it up believing this could bring good fortune; they would never cut their nails on certain days for fear of bringing bad luck; they would always put a coin inside a purse or wallet before they gave it as a present. This indicated the wish for plenty; if they received a brooch or something sharp then they had to give a small coin in return in order to mitigate any danger of getting hurt; the house would be cleaned from top to bottom before an old year ended so that anything bad was swept away making room for goodness, and of course, on Hogmanay, a male member of the family was sent outside before midnight to be the 'first footer' with a lump of coal and black bun to signify a warm hearth and a full larder.

Whatever traditions you adhere to I hope that all of you will enjoy good things as you journey through this new year. Although tradition keeps us in touch with the past and can give us a nostalgic connection to people no longer with us, we must also hope for new things.

In the Book of Revelation (Ch 21) Jesus tells us that he is one who is making all things new. When our focus is on him and away from self, then he will surprise us. In the famous stories of the Arabian Nights we encounter Prince Barmaki. He was famous for giving a beggar a feast consisting of ornate but empty dishes. This is something we could never accuse Jesus of doing. Our Saviour has done the opposite. He has given us a meal to share which although simple in appearance is actually sumptuous. The frugality of bread and wine become a feast in his hands. He took something old and traditional such as the Passover meal and made it forever new.

Every time we celebrate Communion we experience this new thing. It will never become old because it comes from the one who is making all things new. Perhaps this year we could pray for him to work afresh in our lives as individuals and as a congregation. In this way we will be refreshed and enabled to serve him with new commitment, and see one another through fresh and forgiving eyes. And where better to begin than round the Table of our Lord. The old has gone the new has come!


BIRTHDAY CARD FROM 1947

The links were being well maintained. Last year, in May, Eleanor's other daughter came to tour Scotland and staved with us towards the end of her

holiday. She was so happy to spend time with us. Apparently I have the same sense of humour as her mother - I didn't ask what that meant! She now keeps in contact with our daughter Maxie who lives in the village - sadly not by pen - but by social media and iMessage on their tablets.

It's now exactly 50 years since I started that first letter 'Dear Eleanor and Dean.....' we are now half a century older but our friendship remains very strong and our only regret is that we haven't managed to visit each of our respective countries.

KNITTERS CAST THEIR

In 2009 Save the Children Fund launched an appeal for knitted baby hats which created a lot of interest and support. Following on from this a small group of ladies decided to carry on knitting and 'K2 Together' was born!

TEN years later, and with a healthy membership, we are going from strength to strength. Our initial intention was just to continue knitting for neonatal and special care baby units but over the years we have discovered more and more charities and groups that we can support with our work.

To date we have knitted thousands of blankets, hats and jackets (and even some octopuses!) for premature and sick babies in hospital. We have also been able to give special gifts of knitted clothes to friends and families in our community whose babies had a special need when they were born. Hundreds

and hundreds of poppies were lovingly knitted over the years raising over a thousand pounds for Poppy Scotland. Fish and Chip jumpers are sent to Malawi to keep babies born there warm and help reduce infant mortality, these babies would normally be wrapped in newspaper, hence the name 'Fish and Chip!'

Refugees and displaced people have benefitted from being given hats, scarfs and snoods which we have sent to The Ravens Trust and other organisations involved in reaching those in need. The residents of Erskine have been happy to receive lovely blankets and Twiddle Muffs for their residents. Some Twiddle Muffs, which help patients with dementia, have even reached a nursing home in Rumania. Our latest project has involved knitting 'Trauma Teddies 'which the Police use to comfort children they encounter in distressing situations.
