When I last wrote this column in the December issue of Focus, I was delighted to express my sincere thanks on behalf of the Congregational Board for the excellent response from members of the congregation and other to the financial plight that had befallen us last March with the onset of the Pandemic.

With the Church buildings closed for six months and with restricted income, the Giving Campaign kept us going until the end of the year with the added bonus of a financial 'cushion' for the start of the year.

It was therefore with great trepidation that we faced a second lockdown. With the Church and Halls again closed and with the completion of the Children's Panel tenure in the Hall, your Treasurer was again nervous, with bills still coming in for Mission & Aid, Gas, Electricity and other maintenance charges.

But now, with vaccines starting to make inroads on the effects of the Covid-19, we can maybe hope that our lives can return to some form of reality again. Hopefully we will be able to reopen the Church sometime around Easter, though probably

initially still with limited attendance allowed.

This is something we can all look forward to and Church life will spring back and the Halls will become busy again. I can almost smell the coffee already and look forward to Summer Afternoon Tea and a bustling Christmas Fair.

As the late Captain Sir Tom Moore famously said recently: "Tomorrow will be a good day."

And of course he IS right!









(Cont...) We arranged interactive activities for children to enjoy out of doors keeping within the Covid guidelines and we have tried to include every sector of society in some way. A big thank you to all who helped with these projects. We hope that the love of Jesus has been displayed in all that the Church has shared and continues to share.







Anne had a good start in life. Born to loving parents in Bishopbriggs Anne was encouraged to complete higher education. She is remembered from her days at Park School by Jeanette Scobie

as being a senior girl who towered above the others and not only in height it would seem! Anne's sense of mischief and fun often caused her to whistle at the soldiers from the nearby army barracks. And I am glad to say that her mischievous nature never left her.

On leaving school Anne embarked on a very successful nursing career which took her to Switzerland

for a time. This gave her a life-long love of the country and when she married John the honeymoon destination was already decided.

Anne and John had a wonderful marriage and would have been celebrating their Diamond Wedding Anniversary this April. Anne embraced the change of career from successful nurse to successful farmer's wife. Nothing daunted her and nothing was ever too much for her. They were blessed with a family of their own when George, Maxie, Libby and Alex came along. She was a very supportive mother, encouraging them in their chosen careers and choice of partners.

Life was busy but Anne found time to be involved with the Young Farmer's Club coaching youngsters in their debating skills – something that Anne herself excelled in. She was also a member of the Women's Rural and the Guild becoming famous for her culinary skills –especially her meringues. She became a much sought after judge on the SWRI circuit, leading to many fun times for all concerned.

The church was a very important part of Anne's life. She served as an elder and was in fact one of the very first female

elders of the Church of Scotland. Great fun was to be had at all events and fundraisers and the amount of nonsense that would go on was unbelievable. She brought joy wherever she was. Her favourite saying when speaking about her age was that she was only 21 plus VAT!

When retirement beckoned, Anne and John made the move down to Craigielea where they have had many happy years. The past 12 months have been difficult due to

Covid but Anne, indomitable as ever, embraced technology and was able to stay in touch with the family. She was proud to be a Wife, Mum, Mother-In-Law, and Gran. We share in the sadness of the family at this time but we also share in their thanksgiving for a life well lived and love shared.

It has been a privilege to have been part of Anne's life but we share also in her faith that death is not the end and can be faced without fear. Christ has passed that way before us and overcome death to bring us hope of eternal life.

Praise be to our Risen Lord, now and always.


