



Dear Friends,

Summer has arrived! At least it had when I wrote this. I hope by the time you read this the sun is still shining and we continue to feel the benefit of its light and warmth.

Light and warmth are two things we gain from fellowship within the church. Just being with others can brighten our day and help us to dispel the cold of loneliness, isolation or despair. Property Report

Our church building in Station Road has been standing proud for 151 years. It is a testament to all those who at that time gave of their time, talents and money to provide a place of worship for the people of Cardross. It is also a testament to those down through the decades who have continued to do so. Throughout the years it has required good stewardship to keep it in reasonable condition. However, as with most things, the years and the elements have taken their toll.


This year we had a quinquennial survey of the buildings which highlighted the poor condition of the tower. The pointing work is badly needing redone to prevent any more water ingress. We had a conservation architect look at the tower along with the buildings officer from Clyde Presbytery. They are confident that if the work is done then the life of the building can be extended for another 50 or 60 years. To that end we are in the process of finding the best way forward.

However, earlier this month we learned that the Presbytery Mission Plan that had been approved by Presbytery in March had been returned by the Faith Nurture Forum and the General Trustees. The Plan is to be revised and will have serious implications for several congregations within Clyde Presbytery including ours. Certain conditions will have to be adhered to before the Plan is fully approved - mostly concerning accessibility.

In our situation this involves considering disabled access through the main doors of the church and the provision of a disabled toilet. The Kirk Session decided not to contest these conditions and hopefully if all the other congregations affected by the revised do the same the Plan can be implemented in July.

Again, we have begun the process of seeking the best way forward in order to comply.

As a church we seek to be a place of refuge for those who need encouragement, a place of solace for those whose hearts are sad, a place where we can learn from one another and a place where together we can learn more about the love that God has for us all. It has been another busy 6 months as you can see from the content of this Focus magazine and I am, as always, so grateful to everyone for your commitment and dedication.

You will remember from past letters that the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland requires every Presbytery to formulate a Mission Plan for the years ahead. The Presbytery of Clyde agreed our Draft Mission Plan on March 18th and it was sent to the Faith Nurture Forum and General Trustees for approval. With regards to our situation here in Cardross, nothing was to change. Our ministry allocation was to remain at 70% of a full-time equivalent

minister and the buildings were given a category A which means they are considered necessary for mission here in the village.

Unfortunately, the Draft Mission Plan was returned for revision which entails acceptance of certain conditions concerning buildings. *Please refer to the article under 'Property' on the previous page.*

We are not so badly affected as other congregations are with these unexpected changes so, please do not feel downcast about the situation. Our ministry allocation is still assured and with the property issues taken into consideration then we can continue serving the community of Cardross.

We have been presented with a challenge, but every challenge is an opportunity. Remember that we are not alone. We have the support of many professional people who will guide us through the process of alteration and any sign of darkness and cold at the thought of the upheaval and cost will be greatly lessened. No burden is too heavy when others help us carry it.

The work of the Church continues in Mission and Outreach, Discipleship and Fellowship so let us stay focused on the love of God and the needs of our community that we will be able to serve our Lord and others with all that we are and all that we have.

Thanks you knitters - you deserve our applause! 🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌🍌



KIRK SESSION MEMORIES

In year 2000 the National Records of Scotland began the enormous task of digitising the records of the Church of Scotland Kirk Session Minutes.

In 2003 I read an article in Life & Work about this work and the fact that they were looking for volunteers to compile indexes for each parish. With my interest in Family History I thought it was something I would enjoy. I contacted Dr Hazel Anderson who was in charge of this work and I should have realised by the speed with which they accepted my offer that they were not overburdened with volunteers.


I was offered the chance to work on the parishes which related to my family which made the job more personal and in some cases gave an insight into my own folks lives.

As you can imagine minute books were subject to the ravages of damp vestries and animal and insect damage so many do not survive. The page included is page 1 of the Kirk Session Minute Book of 1727 and the Ordination of Mr John Edmonstone as Minister of Cardross. Considering it is almost 300 years old I think it is fairly legible but if anyone would like a translation I am happy to help.

In future editions of FOCUS I will pick out other notable highlights from the Kirk Session minutes of Cardross Parish Church.

Page One of the Kirk Session minutes of 1727, detailing the Ordination of Mr John Edmonstone, as Minister of Cardross.

To give that some historical context this was some 60 years BEFORE the French Revolution and the year the Royal Bank of Scotland was founded.

Jenny Horne became the last alleged 'witch' to be executed in the British Isles, burned at the stake in Dornoch.

This day the Presbytery of Dunbarton did meet here for taking up and Mr John Edmonstone, Probate not to the Office of the holy Ministry in this Parish to the Revd Mr James Beilby Minister of the Gospel in the Parish of Leck was appointed to officiate in that sacred Office; who preached upon these words, Act. 21. Chapter verse 20. He had therefore unto yourselves and to all the people


Mr Sermon and the ordinary Questions proposed by Act of Assembly to every Candidate before his Ordination being proposed, The Presbytery of Dunbarton did by voice and imposition of hands Approve Mr Edmonstone

They braved the 1200 foot climb up to the 170 foot highest point and enjoyed breathtaking 360 degree views of the city from the viewing platform.


We now know who to send up the church tower to fix the pointing!

What Katie did next!

A well known former member of the congregation, Dr Katie Cross, daughter of Christine and Nico Scholarios, has been commissioned by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland along with another colleague to write and present a series of lectures for the highly regarded Chalmers Lecture series. This will involve Katie and Rev Professor John Swinton each writing and presenting three lectures each on the subject of "Hope in the world today". Together they will present the final lecture in person and online. The joint lecture series will be published as a resource for congregations and further publications are also planned.

Katie is a Lecturer at Aberdeen University within the School of Divinity, History, Philosophy, and Art History. Her work and teaching are centred around theologies of trauma, suffering, and disaster. Katie also runs the women's network called "Sophia"

which exists to support, advocate for and empower women and minoritized students in theology. Katie also is a member of the editorial board of the Journal of Practical Theology and assistant editor of the practical theology Hub.
