Finance Report

I am pleased to report that the church's routine income and expenditure up to this point in the financial year is in line with our budgeted estimates.

The Village Hub has been very successful and donations have been made to the church over the course of the year totalling £1,250 which have been gratefully received.

Our current contracts for electricity and gas have been renewed by the Church of Scotland and a new dual fuel supplier, E.ON, has been appointed. The average cost increases are 98% for electricity 105% for gas. These increases are significant and will be taken into account when we set our budget for 2024.

There are some impending capital projects which may impact our finances i.e. removal of trees at boundary wall on to Main Road, creation of an accessible toilet within the church and urgent external and internal repairs to the church tower. These will be monitored closely over the coming months. (See Property Report P6/7)

The Kirk Session has approved my appointment as Church Treasurer from 1st January 2024. I am taking over from Noel Glen who has served the Church as Treasurer for over 30 years. Noel has managed the Church's finances diligently and we sincerely thank him for his long and faithful service to the Church.


MEET OUR NEW PRESBYTERY CLERK - Revd Robert A Hamilton

Property Report


The Conservation architect has been working on the two main issues affecting our church.

The first is the repair work required on the church tower. The cap of the tower needs repointing with lime mortar and the vegetation removed. Internally the wooden beams will require to be assessed by a wood specialist and may require to be partially replaced. Both these tasks are expensive and we intend to apply for grants to help with this project

The second issue is improving access to the church for people with disabilities. We already have a ramp for access to the church via the church office and it has been proposed that we run a slabbed path 1.2 metres wide from the main entrance gate to the existing ramp. In addition the existing toilet at the back of the office could be converted into an accessible toilet. Significant structural changes will be needed for the new toilet and a building warrant will be required. Again we plan to apply for grants to assist with funding this work.


Work has also been undertaken to cut back the trees in the church hall grounds that have been overhanging the main road and causing stress to the boundary wall. LJX Tree Services were contracted to do this work and it was completed at the end of September.

We were shown the memorial to Mother Theresa and then were shown two of her hospitals. The first was a hospital for children row upon row of small cots with a little child in each cot. It was very sad. The second hospital was for women - it was so awful it is difficult to describe

As soon as we entered the ward one of our group said 'we should not be looking at these women' so we all turned around and walked out again. The women were all so thin and haggard looking with eyes staring out of their heads. While appreciating all the work Mother Theresa did it was all so sad to see the people she was helping and hope that after all these

years they are all back to full health and strength.

Another memory from that holiday is the hottest curry I have ever had on the plane from Calcutta to Delhi' I thought my throat was never going to be the same again!



Kirk Session tribute to John Russell

Psalm 147 is a song of praise to God for his hand in creation and his continuing grace to those who place their trust in him for all things at all times. In verse 10-11 we read of God that, "His pleasure is not in strong horses, nor his delight in brave soldiers; but he takes pleasure in those who honour him, in those who trust in his constant love."

Such a one was our friend and fellow elder John Russell. Here was a man who honoured God throughout his life and put his complete trust in God's providence and grace. As a farmer he saw the hand of God in the beauty and bounty of creation and knew the pain of loss when life returned to its divine source. But always, he trusted and honoured God.

As the writer of Proverbs once said, "When a man's ways please the Lord, He makes even his enemies to

be at peace with him. Better is a little with righteousness, than vast revenues without justice. A man's heart plans his way, But the Lord directs his steps." (16:7-9)

The Lord directed John's steps from the day of his birth until the day of his death.

Born on September 28th 1933 to George and Elizabeth Russell when the family lived at east Fulton Farm, near Linwood John was a loving big brother to Jasmine who was born in 1939. In December 1940 the family moved to Lea Farm, Cardross, just in time to suffer the Clybebank and Greenock blitzes in the early part of WW2. And of course, Cardross was badly hit too. One of the bombs that fell but thankfully failed to explode, remains in the garden at Craigielea to this day. You will be pleased to learn that it has been diffused! It became a topic of interest, and the school children came from the primary school to see it

as part of their lessons about the war. John loved telling them all about it.

John loved being with people of all ages. He loved a good blether. He was gracious in his encounters making us all feel at ease. He was good company and being such a big man, he had a real sense of presence. Physically he was indeed strong, well suited to the farming

life, but he also had an inner strength that surpassed outward appearances. His faith gave him the ability to appreciate God's goodness and strength to endure times of trial. He exercised this faith through service to the church. A respected elder since 1966 John was also a dear friend to us all

His life with Anne was happy and fulfilling. They made a good team and worked well together keeping the farm going and

bringing up their family. In retirement they expanded their horizons further and loved to travel. Anne's passing brought a deep sense of loss, and the last few years were challenging in various ways for John. The love and care of his family kept him going and even up to the last they did all that was possible for him.

John was one of life's true gentlemen. Once committed to something he would see it through. He was trustworthy, practical, a man of integrity and intelligence who will be sadly missed and fondly remembered.

We continue to hold, George, Maxie, Libby, Alex and the whole family circle in prayer at this difficult time for them all.

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Kirk Session Memories



The National Records of Scotland, is the official repository for Kirk Sessions and Presbytery Records which are earlier than those in current use. They also hold the historical records of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and the records of Synods, which were abolished in 1993. Most church records which are more than 30 years old can be consulted by the general public in the Historical Search Room in New Register House, in Edinburgh.

It should, of course be understood, that Kirk Session Minute Books and also the Old Parish Registers which were records of Baptisms, Marriage Banns and Deaths, pre 1855 and kept by the Minister or Session Clerk of the Parish Church, were stored in damp, unheated vestries and were prev to insect and vermin depredation. Many do not survive, including many of the Kirk Session Minutes for Cardross, which show huge gaps. Nothing prior to 1727 and a gap between 1734 The next set of Kirk Session and 1810. Minutes runs from 1810-1873. All of our church records from 1900 are safely in the hands of the National Records of Scotland.

Images of pages from the Church's Kirk Sessions and Court Records from 1559 to 1900 are available on the **ScotlandsPeople** website. These records contain details of key events in communities across the country offering remarkable insights into the everyday lives of ordinary Scots, as well as accounts of exceptional historical events, such as wars, witchcraft trials and epidemics. These records of kirk sessions, presbyteries, synods and the General Assembly, makeup a major part of Scotland's written history and are used by a wide range of academic, professional and amateur researchers, especially genealogists and ecclesiastical historians.

The Kirk Sessions also saw themselves as the quardians of the moral welfare of the local congregation and parish. The Minutes of Cardross Kirk Session in February & March 1728 (see below - Report of a scandal) deal with the case of an unmarried mother and how she must state to the three Elders, sent by the Kirk Session, who is the father of the expected child. Both accuser and accused are summoned before the Kirk Session to make separate statements and the Kirk Session will decide who is telling the truth regarding the paternity of this as yet unborn child. Similar items appear regularly with, in some cases, witnesses called before the session and their statements noted in the Minutes Book.

Lottery funding for village HUB



The Village Hub resumed in August after a short summer break. We are pleased to be able to continue to provide this service for the community. We have been welcoming our regular customers and several new faces.

During the Summer the Hub committee through the Church made an application for grant funding to the Community Lottery to create a disabled access to the garden area beside the Bible Garden. We were delighted to have been successful in receiving a considerable grant towards the costs of the work to be undertaken.

The work has commenced with the area having been dug out and it is expected to be completed over the next few weeks weather dependent.

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
